TAMALE, GHANA



Bringing hope and love to vulnerable children and their families living in extreme poverty in northern Ghana.

WHY TAMALE

Northern Ghana is a region deeply impacted by poverty, where agriculture is at the mercy of droughts and floods. Tamale, the capital of this region, sits in an area where 70% of the population is Muslim, with the remaining 30% split between Christians and idol worshippers. In the villages, Christian communities are more common, but traditional practices still hold strong.

The challenges here are profound: school enrollment is low, illiteracy is high, economic infrastructure is lacking, and opportunities for women are scarce. Many women are widows, and when a husband passes away, it's not uncommon for his family to claim everything—the home, the property and, worst of all, the children. Girls, in particular, face an uphill battle, as cultural norms often dismiss the importance of their education, leaving them especially vulnerable.



OUR PROGRAM | CREATE HOPE GHANA

Create Hope Ghana began when Jonathan Haruna and Rhoda Wumbei (now our Ghana Program Directors) met a girl who couldn't attend school due to her family's financial struggles and the belief that 'girls don't need education.' The family needed just \$1 to send her to school. Jonathan and Rhoda immediately helped and began sharing with this family and others the importance of education for girls.

Today, Create Hope Ghana is assisting over 600 children and their families with nutritious meals, quality education, mentoring, and a supportive community. Jonathan and Rhoda are also helping widows and their children find secure homes. Their work is driven by a deep love for Christ, motivating them to share the gospel and help others discover and pursue their God-given potential.
